

QUICK FACTS

OVERVIEW - LEGAL AID MANITOBA

- Legal Aid Manitoba provides legal help to people with low-incomes. Legal Aid is fundamental to a fair and balanced justice system.
- Legal Aid Manitoba opened its doors to clients in 1972. About half our cases are handled by staff lawyers; the other half are handled by private lawyers who are paid a fee for each case.
- Legal Aid Manitoba provided assistance on a formal or informal basis to 80,186 people in 2006-2007.
- Legal Aid Manitoba assists low-income citizens who qualify:
 - * in **domestic** matters such as divorce or child custody
 - * adults or youth facing serious **criminal** charges
 - * in disputes involving **poverty law** such as workers compensation or disability pensions or welfare
 - * in cases of **public interest** such as environmental, consumer or Charter of Rights challenges
- Legal Aid Manitoba has offices in Winnipeg, Brandon, Thompson, Dauphin and The Pas. Staff travel
 to more than 40 rural and northern communities on a regular basis. Approximately 160 people are
 employed by Legal Aid Manitoba across the province.
- The Legal Aid Manitoba Act is provincial legislation which established Legal Aid Manitoba as an independent organization operating at arms length from government. A Management Council of seven to nine people appointed by Cabinet offers strategic and financial direction.
- Legal Aid Manitoba is funded by the Province of Manitoba, the Government of Canada, the Manitoba Law Foundation and fees paid by clients.

MESSAGE FROM THE COUNCIL CHAIR

This is the first full year for the new Legal Aid Manitoba Management Council, and it certainly was a busy one.

The Operational Review which was commissioned by the previous Board of Directors and conducted by Prairie Research Associates was released and its findings and recommendations were far reaching. A special meeting of all staff was called by the Executive Director on May 5th, 2006 to discuss the Operational Review findings and recommendations. Some of the most significant findings and recommendations were:

- Some people were receiving duty counsel legal aid although they were not entitled to. It was recommended procedures be modified to ensure eligibility screening for all clients. Procedures were modified and more financial reviews were put in place. This process is ongoing.
- The review concluded that some clients try to exploit eligibility and attempt to change lawyers for a variety of reasons. It was recommended that only one change of counsel be authorized, except in unusual circumstances. We accepted the recommendation and it has been enforced.
- Management of files concerning quality assurance and performance management was also a major area of concern in the review. The authors opined that although Legal Aid Manitoba claimed that it was offering high quality service, no objective measurement to support this assertion existed.

No reviews of files after they were closed took place, and no assurances could be given that the matter had been handled appropriately. Management was encouraged by the review to establish more handson management. Roles and responsibilities of senior managers needed to be clarified. We accepted the recommendations and changes were made. Additional professional development resources will be provided to

address human resources issues.

An internal committee is studying the issue of benchmarks in order that

factual comparisons can be made with the private bar.

The Operational Review is a good resource for Legal Aid Manitoba as it assists us in moving forward. Several operational changes were made and others are ongoing.

Another significant issue that faced the organization was the new computer system specifically designed for Legal Aid Manitoba, known as LAMAS, that had been in the works for some years. The new system went live on January 2nd, 2007 and has been functioning as expected. Our technical staff continues to improve the system to address performance issues raised by employees.

For the first time in Legal Aid Manitoba history, the Chair visited all Legal Aid Manitoba offices outside Winnipeg. It was a learning experience and an opportunity to meet and receive feedback from Legal Aid Manitoba staff, the private bar and community members. This visit will now be an annual event.

The Public Interest Law Centre, a branch of Legal Aid Manitoba, celebrated its 25th anniversary on March 1st, 2007, and His Honour The Honourable John Harvard, the Lieutenant Governor of Manitoba, hosted a reception at Government House. People who were involved in establishing the Public Interest Law Centre and have since moved on to other careers were present and reminisced about "old times".

During this fiscal period, Legal Aid Manitoba undertook a strategic plan development initiative. All Legal Aid Manitoba employees were asked to complete a survey



designed by a consultant retained by Council to assist with the process.

Several meetings took place across Manitoba to obtain additional input from staff about what the Strategic Plan for Legal Aid Manitoba should be for the next five years. This is the first time that a Strategic Plan is being developed, and after it is approved by the Management Council, it will be reviewed annually as required. We are excited about this initiative, as staff realize that we want Legal Aid Manitoba to be a place of excellence in order to allow us to meet our statutory mandate.

Concerning governance, By-law No. 1 was passed which will assist the Management Council in discharging its duties. No organizational by-law existed and it was deemed essential by Council.

The terms of reference of the Advisory Committee were developed and approved, and representatives of the community at large and the legal profession were appointed.

Having Legal Aid Manitoba lawyers represent two or more co-accused or both sides in family matters, was one of the significant changes to the *Legal Aid Manitoba Act*. Several internal changes were made to comply with past judicial directives, and we believe that we have the ability to fulfill the legislative objective, and comply with Court rulings.

Over the years, due to financial difficulties, Legal Aid Manitoba was forced to impose a holdback on lawyers' legal fees. We are pleased to report that we were able to approve an indefinite holdback holiday, and will use our best efforts so that we will not have to impose the holdback again.

During the next fiscal year, Legal Aid Manitoba will be reviewing the tariff paid to the private bar and we will make our recommendations to the Provincial Government. It is essential for the sake of the justice system that sufficient funds be granted to Legal Aid Manitoba to enable us to address the valid concerns of the private bar.

Legal Aid Manitoba thanks the Government of Manitoba, the Government of Canada, the Manitoba Law Foundation, and some of our clients who financially contribute to our operations. We also thank all stakeholders who advocate on behalf of Legal Aid Manitoba.

MESSAGE FROM THE EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR

The past fiscal year marked a challenging and exciting period in the life of our organization. With the support of Management Council, we started a multi-stage process of renewal, re-branding and revitalization to reach the common operational goal of creating an innovative and collaborative organization which is flexible and responsive to our clients' legal needs.

Propelled by our Operational Review recommendations as well as recent legislative changes, we embarked on a strategic planning process to better position the organization for future challenges and opportunities. A major focus during 2006/07 has been evaluating the organization and identifying strategic objectives for the coming years.

With the assistance of Sequus International, a management consulting firm, we conducted a system-wide questionnaire and meetings to help identify our strengths, weaknesses, opportunities and challenges. This exercise allowed us to frankly and critically assess our roles within the justice system and discuss how we can alter and develop our services, realign our resources, and liaise with key stakeholders to ensure low-income Manitobans can continue to meaningfully enforce their constitutional rights.

The flow of information and ideas from these meetings proved immensely beneficial in identifying key strategic issues requiring our attention. A Strategic Planning Sub-Committee was formed to further develop and refine staff input into areas of strategic focus. These areas will guide the strategic, programming, and policy changes that will be implemented by Management Council and senior management over the next 5 years.

Reflecting over the past year, I am also pleased with several other notable initiatives and events which have positively impacted LAM's organizational operations and continued to ensure affordable access to justice for all Manitobans in need, including:

 LAMAS - We rolled out our new computer application system (LAMAS) on January 2nd, 2007. LAMAS incorporates Legal



Aid's time management and certificate system into one application relying exclusively on open source software. LAMAS is expected to improve our capability to pro-actively address changes in the legal environment and increase our ability to interact with clients, private bar and staff across the province.

- The Collaborative Law Project The Collaborative Law Pilot Project was formally integrated as a permanent initiative within our service delivery. The project demonstrated that within a legal aid system, the collaborative law model is able to resolve complex cases in a cost effective manner.
- The Full Service Duty Counsel Project (FSDC)

 The FSDC was incorporated as a permanent process in our service delivery. The process was shown to positively contribute to earlier settlements, a more comprehensive range of services for child protection respondents and improved service quality. One of the unique aspects of the program is the introduction of a social worker as part of the duty counsel team.
- Investment Fund In order to address justice efficiencies and areas of need for services for the 2003-2006 time period, the federal government provided funding for LAM to implement specific projects to improve coverage and to stimulate innovation. LAM was able to develop 18 projects with positive results.
- The PILC's 25th Anniversary The Public Interest Law Centre (PILC) celebrated its 25th anniversary

in March 2007. Over the years, PILC has proven to be an invaluable tool for furthering legal precedents for many public interest and low income issues, improving the quality of life for many disadvantaged groups and, in certain legal areas, Manitobans generally.

- The Complexity Weighted Caseload Project A
 committee was formed to brainstorm how we could
 formally incorporate case complexity into our staff
 lawyer productivity measurements. In January 2007,
 LAM began a complexity weighted caseload pilot
 project. The pilot project will assess the viability of
 measuring staff lawyer productivity using LAM's
 tariff of fees paid to private bar solicitors.
- Drug Treatment Court LAM continues to provide duty counsel services in the recent Winnipeg Drug Treatment Court initiative.

This year six long-term staff members retired. We acknowledge and thank each of those employees for dedicated years of service to Legal Aid Manitoba.

A number of priorities have already been set for the coming year to continue improving and strengthening LAM. Notably, we will be finalizing our 5 year strategic plan, developing a yearly business plan and reporting process, as well as redesigning our public materials to ensure that we meet our desired strategic initiatives. We will continue actively pursuing several innovative initiatives such as the complexity weighted caseload project, a re-examination of our criminal and family service delivery through "super offices" in Winnipeg, the establishment of conflict offices in specific rural communities, an evaluation of our financial eligibility guidelines as well as review of our governance process to assure its effectiveness and efficiency. In light of the difficulties in maintaining private bar participation, LAM will also be actively pursuing a thorough review of our tariff of fees.

In 2006/07, we provided legal services to over 80,000 clients seeking assistance with their criminal and family matters. Our service delivery remains exceptionally high despite evolving case complexity and private bar attrition. LAM is very fortunate to have such dedicated staff and private bar partners diligently and tirelessly working to ensure accessible legal coverage for Manitobans.

Specifically, I wish to acknowledge all Legal Aid Manitoba staff and private bar stakeholders for their continued commitment to the idea of legal aid and the principles of equality. I would like to thank our funding partners, notably the Province of Manitoba, Government of Canada, the Manitoba Law Foundation and those private bar lawyers who have contributed to LAM through pro bono work and support. This commitment makes LAM one of the best legal aid programs in the country. Together we can ensure a strong and healthy legal aid system for Manitoba, a system which plays an integral and invaluable role in shaping a just and humane society.



- Legal Aid Manitoba is marking its 35th year of service to low-income Manitobans.
- Management Council and the Executive team are committed to providing quality service that is guided by a five-year strategic plan and companion yearly business plan. To that end, an unprecedented series of facilitated meetings open to all employees was held across the organization to develop key areas of focus and action plans. Online surveys also solicited employee input.
- As a result of consultations, larger Legal Aid Manitoba offices are being reconfigured into smaller units to afford staff more hands-on supervision and guidance.
- Under the new Legal Aid Manitoba Act proclaimed in August 2005, Legal Aid Manitoba now has the
 capacity to set up conflict offices. Both established and new offices ensure Legal Aid Manitoba has the
 capability to represent multiple accused or both parties in a domestic case while avoiding conflicts of
 interest.
- Legal Aid Manitoba shifted to Linux in 2002 and as a result is saving \$225,000 annually in licensing fees, or more than \$1 million in savings so far. Legal Aid Manitoba continues to be a key supporter in developing UBUNTU and the Linux Terminal Server Project and participated in knowledge-sharing conferences in Brazil, Spain, France, California and Detroit last year.
- Legal Aid Manitoba introduced a new, locally developed information system (LAMAS) using open source technologies to streamline and integrate area office and community law office information systems.
- Legal Aid Manitoba provided assistance on a formal or informal basis to 80,186 people in 2006/07.




The majority of people we serve come into contact with Legal Aid Manitoba in court.

LAW OFFICES OF LEGAL AID

- In The Pas, Supervising Attorney Brian Midwinter was appointed Provincial Court Judge with a swearingin ceremony held in January. Annette Horst was elected to the Manitoba Bar Association Executive in June and has assumed the position of Supervising Attorney.
- In Brandon, staff continued to be involved with various community organizations including Brandon University Board of Governors, Salvation Army, Brandon Community Options, The United Way, Westman Women's Shelter, Manitoba Bar Association and other school and community councils and sports teams.
- In Thompson, private bar participation is down 65% compared to last year while there is a growing demand for Legal Aid Manitoba services.
- Parklands Legal Aid (Dauphin) faces a similar challenge, where the number of private bar lawyers in the region prepared to do legal aid family work has dropped by 69% in the past year.

The number of private bar lawyers able and willing to take on Legal Aid Manitoba cases continues to decline.

- The Public Interest Law Centre marked its 25th anniversary with a reception hosted by the Lieutenant Governor of Manitoba, His Honour The Honourable John Harvard, attended by numerous judges, legislators and leaders within the legal community.
- Significant victories on behalf of Manitobans by the Public Interest Law Centre (PILC) in 2006/07 include:
 - A \$60 million auto insurance rate rebate ordered by the Manitoba Public Utilities Board to Manitoba Public Insurance ratepayers. PILC, acting on behalf of Manitoba consumers and seniors, played a central role in that decision.
 - The City of Thompson rescinded its youth curfew by-law shortly after PILC filed a statement of claim, outlining how the bylaw violated sections of *The Charter of Rights and Freedoms* as well as *The Municipal Act*.
 - In May 2006, the Province of Manitoba became one of only two provinces to allow internationally trained medical graduates to compete equally with Canadian graduates for post-graduate medical educations.
 - In September 2006, PILC launched a human rights complaint on behalf of Community Living Manitoba, challenging the province to provide a community living option to approximately 370
 individuals with intellectual disabilities who are forced to reside at the Manitoba Developmental
 Centre in Portage la Prairie.
 - In December, Stony Mountain Institution closed the Crossroads Range after PILC successfully argued the Range operated in essence like segregation with inmates kept in their cells most of the day and deprived of any meaningful access to Aboriginal Elders and spiritual ceremonies, programs and employment.
- Legal Aid Manitoba continued to assist low income people who are arrested around the clock. The Criminal Law Office handled more than 1,100 calls for assistance through its Brydges on-call service. Overall, Legal Aid Manitoba handled 18,028 calls.
- The Criminal Law Office instituted mentoring of junior staff lawyers and regular lawyer file reviews.
- Criminal Law Office staff participated in the Court Staffing Committee formed to review how Duty Counsel assignments are staffed.

- The Family Law Office continued to offer broad coverage, including family, child protection, poverty and mental health law. The service delivery models employed are innovative including traditional litigation, Collaborative Law and Full Service Duty Counsel.
- The Family Law Office championed the causes of low income women and children in domestic cases through work with Osborne House and other shelters as well as A Woman's Place. In February 2007, a paralegal was added to the office, providing extra staffing power to attend to hospitals and personal care homes to see clients who are unable to attend the Winnipeg Drop-In Centre.
- The Winnipeg Law Office opened April 1, 2006 as the first true conflict office for Legal Aid Manitoba.
- The successful Collaborative Law Project, initiated in 2003, was rolled into the Winnipeg Law Office.
- The University of Manitoba Law Centre (UMLC) increased the summer staffing compliment to 4 students.
 This was made possible through additional funding from the Manitoba Law Foundation. The UMLC assisted 394 people over the course of the year.
- The University of Manitoba Law Centre continued to be an excellent source of development for students. Students receive advice and guidance from Legal Aid Manitoba experienced criminal staff lawyers.

A BRIEF OVERVIEW

OUR HISTORY 35 YEARS OF SERVICE

Legal Aid Manitoba provides legal help to people with low incomes. We strive to serve all clients with respect and dignity.

Legal Aid Manitoba works to ensure people with low incomes have the protections guaranteed in Canada by *The Charter of Rights and Freedoms*, enacted as part of *The Constitution Act* in 1982. Our service is fundamental to a fair and balanced justice system.

In the 1930s and 1940s, The Law Society of Manitoba set up Canada's first program for poor people, so they might get free legal help. Lawyers volunteered their time. However, demand for legal services grew rapidly and lawyers quickly became overburdened with cases.

Legal Aid became a legislated program in Manitoba in 1971 and opened its doors to clients in 1972. Legal Aid Manitoba operates at arms length from government. We are funded by the Province of Manitoba, the Government of Canada, the Manitoba Law Foundation and fees paid by clients.

Today we serve rural and northern Manitobans through four regional offices. Lawyers and paralegals regularly travel to more than 40 outlying communities.

OUR MANDATE

Legal Aid Manitoba is governed by *The Legal Aid Manitoba Act* as approved by members of the provincial legislature. The Act requires that we:

- Provide quality legal advice and representation to eligible low-income individuals
- Administer the delivery of legal aid in a cost-effective and efficient manner
- Provide advice to the Minister on legal aid generally and on the specific legal needs of low income individuals


OUR KEY SERVICES FOR THOSE WHO QUALIFY, WE HELP:

- People with family issues such as divorce, child custody, maintenance enforcement and child protection matters
- Adults and youth who are facing criminal charges
- People with disputes involving welfare, workers compensation or disability benefits
- Groups and individuals with test cases in the areas of consumer, poverty, environmental, Aboriginal and Charter of Rights challenges
- We do not handle real estate transactions, wills and estates, adoptions, corporate and commercial matters, or civil litigation matters such as people suing each other


Certificates - Gender Distribution (%)

STRATEGIC PLANNING PROCESS 2007/08 to 2011/12

In November 2006, Management Council, the Executive Director and the senior management team embarked on development of a strategic plan to guide the organization over the next 5 years.

LAM retained the services of Sequus International, a management consulting firm, to assist in its development through a multi-step process:

- 1. Pre-planning An online survey was developed to gather information from all LAM employees about the organization's mission and vision as well as frankly discuss LAM's strengths, weaknesses, opportunities and perceived threats. This information allowed LAM to critically evaluate itself and its service delivery.
- 2. Strategic Planning Event On November 24th, 2006, LAM and Sequus International hosted a strategic planning retreat with members of senior management and Management Council. Management Council and senior management took stock of LAM's operations and progress in meeting current goals and objectives using the staff survey feedback. From this exercise, the group determined that changes were required to address internal issues in order to maximize LAM's performance and effectively meet client needs. Through group discussions, the session highlighted several key areas of strategic focus for the organization.
- 3. Strategic Planning Committee A Strategic Planning Committee was struck to continue the process started at the strategic planning retreat. The committee fleshed out a draft of LAM's strategic plan for the areas of strategic focus identified at the November meeting. Committee discussions and additional staff input allowed for the development of proposed action plans and timelines for each area of strategic focus. From this committee, a draft strategic plan was produced.
- 4. Staff Consultations Input about LAM's draft strategic plan was sought from all staff members. A series of employee workshops was held in January and February 2007 in Winnipeg, Brandon and The Pas to explain the strategic planning process and solicit staff ideas and feedback. New areas of focus emerged as a result of this exercise. This ensures that the strategic plan accurately represents the needs of the entire organization.

AREAS OF STRATEGIC FOCUS

Based on feedback from employees, Management Council, senior management and the Strategic Planning Committee, nine areas of strategic focus to improve overall service were identified.

- 1. People Management
- 2. Client Service
- 3. Resources and Finance
- 4. Communications
- 5. Relationship with the Private Bar
- 6. Shortage of Criminal and Family Lawyers
- 7. Orientation, Training and Development of Support Staff
- 8. Continuously Improve Technology
- 9. Governance

NEXT STEPS


Each area of strategic focus will include specific goals, actions and timelines. Once Management Council has approved the strategic plan, a companion annual business plan will be developed to ensure its execution.

Private Bar/Staff Breakdown




Just over half of all Legal Aid Manitoba certificates are handled by our private bar partners.

LEGAL AID CASE VOLUME HISTORY







Notes to Financial Statements for the year ended March 31, 2007

1. <u>Nature of the Corporation</u>

Legal Aid Manitoba (the Corporation) was established by an Act of the Legislative Assembly of Manitoba.

The purpose of the Corporation, as set out in the Act, is to service the public interest by:

- a) providing quality legal advice and representation to eligible low-income individuals;
- b) administering the delivery of legal aid in a cost-effective and efficient manner; and
- c) providing advice to the Minister on legal aid generally and on the specific legal needs of low-income individuals.

The Corporation is economically dependent upon the Province of Manitoba. Other revenue sources include The Manitoba Law Foundation, individual clients, and third party agencies.

2. Significant Accounting Policies

a) <u>Accounting Basis</u>

The financial statements are prepared in accordance with Canadian generally accepted accounting principles.

b) Revenue Recognition

The Corporation follows the deferral method of accounting for contributions. Restricted contributions are recognized as revenue in the year in which the related expenses are incurred. Unrestricted contributions are recognized as revenue when received or receivable if the amount to be received can be reasonably estimated and collection is reasonably assured.

c) Recognition of Contributions from Clients

Clients may be required to pay a portion or all of the legal costs incurred on their behalf by Legal Aid Manitoba based on the clients' ability to pay.

Notes to Financial Statements for the year ended March 31, 2007

i) Agreements to Pay

Clients who are able to pay, sign an agreement to pay for their portion of the applicable legal costs. The amount the client is required to pay is specified on the legal aid certificate. The revenue and receivable are recognized when the certificate is signed.

ii) Expanded Eligibility

Under terms of expanded eligibility, clients are required to pay all of the legal costs and an administration fee of 25% of the Corporation's cost of the case up to a maximum of \$250. The revenue and receivable are recognized based on the date of the lawyer's billing.

iii) Charges on Land

Liens are registered under Section 17 of *The Legal Aid Manitoba Act* in a Land Titles Office against property owned by clients. The revenue and receivable are recognized at the later of the date the lien is filed or the date of the lawyer's billing. Collection of these accounts in the future is dependent on the client disposing of the property or arranging for payment.

d) Allowance for Doubtful Accounts

The allowances for doubtful accounts are determined annually based on a review of individual accounts. The allowances represent management's best estimate of probable losses on receivables. Where circumstances indicate doubt as to the ultimate collectibility of an account, specific allowances are established for individual accounts. In addition to the allowances identified on an individual account basis, the Corporation establishes a further allowance representing management's best estimate of additional probable losses in the remaining accounts receivable.

e) <u>Capital Assets</u>

Capital assets are recorded at cost less accumulated amortization. Amortization of capital assets is recorded on a straight-line basis over the estimated useful lives of the capital assets as follows:

- Furniture and office equipment 10 years
- Computer hardware and software 4 years
- Leasehold improvements over the term of the lease

f) Measurement Uncertainty

The preparation of financial statements requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and disclosure of contingencies at the date of the financial statements and the reported amounts of revenues and expenses during the reporting period. Actual results could differ from these estimates.

g) <u>Pension Plan</u>

Employees of the Corporation are pensionable under *The Civil Service Superannuation Act*. The Corporation accrues a provision for the liability for the employer's share of employee pension benefits, including future cost of living adjustments, based on actuarial calculations. When actual experience varies from actuarial estimates, the adjustment needed is recognized immediately in net revenue (expense) in the year that the actuarial gain or loss arises.

h) <u>Financial Instruments</u>

The Corporation's financial instruments consist of cash, short-term investments, accounts receivable, accounts payable, and accrued liabilities. Unless otherwise noted, it is management's opinion that the Corporation is not exposed to significant interest, currency or credit risks arising from these financial instruments. The fair value of these financial instruments approximates their carrying values.

7. <u>Long-term Receivable - Severance Benefits</u>

The Province accepted responsibility for the severance benefits accumulated by Legal Aid employees to March 31, 1998. Accordingly, the opening severance pay liability balance as at April 1, 1998 of \$716,166 was completely offset by a receivable from the Province. There are no terms of repayment for the receivable, and the amount will remain fixed at \$716,166.

8. <u>Severance Liability</u>

Effective April 1, 1998, Legal Aid commenced recording the estimated liability for accumulated severance pay benefits for their employees. The amount of this estimated liability is based on actuarial calculations. The periodic actuarial valuation of this liability may determine that an adjustment is needed to the actuarial calculation when actual experience is different from that expected and/or because of changes in actuarial assumptions used. The resulting actuarial gains or losses are recognized immediately in net revenue (expense) in the year that the actuarial gain or loss arises.

An actuarial report was completed for the severance pay liability as at March 31, 2007 by Ellement & Ellement Ltd., Consulting Actuaries. The report provides a formula to update liability on an annual basis.

Severance pay, at the employee's date of retirement, will be determined using the eligible employee's years of service and based on the calculation as set by the Province of Manitoba. The maximum payout is currently 23 weeks at the employee's weekly salary at the date of retirement. Eligibility will require that the employee has achieved a minimum of nine years of service and that the employee is retiring from the Corporation.

A statutory grant, pursuant to subsection 90(1) of *The Legal Profession Act*, is received annually from The Manitoba Law Foundation. The Corporation's share under the Act is 50% of the total interest on lawyers' trust accounts as received by the Foundation or a minimum of \$1,007,629, whichever is greater. In the event that interest received by the Foundation in the preceding year, after deduction of the Foundation's operational expenses, is not sufficient to pay the statutory minimum of \$1,007,629 to Legal Aid Manitoba, the Act provides for pro-rata sharing of the net interest.

Other grants from The Manitoba Law Foundation are received pursuant to subsection 90(4) of *The Legal Profession Act*. These grants are restricted for the Public Interest Law Centre and the University Law Centre. At March 31, 2007, there were no funds remaining from these grants.

14. <u>Provision for Employee Pension Benefits</u>

Pension costs consist of the employer's share of pension benefits to retired employees, as well as the increase in the unfunded pension liability during the fiscal year. This liability is determined by an actuarial valuation every three years with the balances for the intervening years being determined by a formula provided by the actuary. The most recent valuation was completed as at December 31, 2004 by Ellement & Ellement Ltd., Consulting Actuaries.

The key actuarial assumptions were a rate of return of 6.50% (2001 - 6.75%), 2.50% inflation (2001 - 2.75%), salary rate increases of 4.25% (2001 - 4.5%) and post retirement indexing at 2/3 of the inflation rate. The projected benefit method was used and the liability has been extrapolated to March 31, 2007 using a formula provided by the actuary.

The Province of Manitoba has accepted responsibility for the unfunded pension liability. Accordingly the provision for employee pension benefits is offset by a receivable from the Province of Manitoba. There are no terms of repayment for this receivable.

15. Restricted Net Assets - Wrongful Conviction Cases

During the fiscal year ended March 31, 2006 the Province of Manitoba approved a reallocation of \$130,000 from Legal Aid Manitoba's unrestricted net assets. This funding is being provided for section 696 applications under the Criminal Code for wrongful conviction appeals on a pilot project basis until March 31, 2007. In the current fiscal year, the Corporation incurred expenses of \$204 (2006 - \$38,689) for private bar fees and disbursements related to wrongful conviction cases. The balance remaining is \$91,107.

16. Public Sector Compensation Disclosure

For the purposes of *The Public Sector Compensation Disclosure Act*, all compensation for employees, Management Council members, and the private bar fees and disbursements from Legal Aid Manitoba is disclosed in a separate statement.

17. <u>Contingencies</u>

Legal Aid Manitoba is named as a defendant in litigations where action has commenced or is anticipated. While the ultimate outcome of these proceedings cannot be predicted at this time, management and its legal counsel are of the opinion that the outcome will not have a material effect on the financial position of the Corporation. No provision has been made in the financial statements in respect of these claims as of March 31, 2007.

18. <u>Legal Aid Manitoba Application System (LAMAS)</u>

A new software application system was installed and implemented fiscal 2006/07 at a cost of \$764,850. The system was paid for by the Department of Justice and therefore, a capital asset has not been recorded in these financial statements.


