SAYWHAT? Lawyers who Work for Free?

- Finding the right firm with the right people (*hint: look left*)
- Creating interest in researching fundamental legal rights to a basic income guarantee

What Were we Asked to Contribute?

- 6 lawyers Team Leader/research coordinator/4 researchers
- Experience in labour/employment, human rights, indigenous law
- Research and develop <u>legal arguments</u> based upon Canadian law, statute, Charter, human rights principles, for possible future use in test cases or to assist in development of model legislation

Paper 1: Existing Initiatives

Johanna Willows

 Looked at existing BIG initiatives in Canada/US/Netherlands/ Switzerland/Namibia/India/Cyprus/Brazil/Columbia/Finland/ Malawi and Zambia

Paper 2: s.7 Canadian Charter of Rights and Freedoms

Kristen Worbanski

- S. 7 right to life, liberty and security of the person
- To what extent does case law interpreting s. 7 support the argument that there is a right to a BIG?

Paper 3: s. 15 Canadian Charter of Rights and Freedoms

Joel Deeley and Johanna Willows

- S.15 guarantees that every individual is to be considered equal before and under the law, and sets out limits on government's ability to impose laws that cause or perpetuate inequality
- Supreme Court has recognized that this section is to be generously and purposively interpreted (*Eldridge*)

Paper 4: s. 36(1) Constitution

Johanna Willows and Joel Deeley

- S. 36(1) Parliament and the legislatures, together with the Government of Canada or provincial governments, are committed to promoting equal opportunities for the well-being of Canadians, furthering economic development to reduce disparity and opportunities, and providing essential public services of reasonable quality to all Canadians.
- Does this section create an obligation or just an objective?

Paper 5: *Human Rights Code Analysis*

Shannon Carson

- Well recognized that human rights legislation is considered to be quasi-constitutional, and must be given a broad and liberal interpretation that accords with its purpose.
- Can an existing service, right, or benefit be identified as discriminatory?
- Can a social disadvantage be claimed as a ground of discrimination?

Paper 6: *Indigenous Peoples and BIG*

Kelly Olson

Can Aboriginal and treaty rights, including those contained in the Numbered Treaties, the Natural Resource Transfer Agreements, The Constitution Act, fiduciary duties owed to Aboriginal peoples, or the honour of the Crown, be used to form the basis for a right to basic income?
